Session Formats

Problem Solvers

Sessions will begin with brainstorming to identify particular problems that need to be understood and solved. (This could also happen in advance of the meeting to save time.) Attendees will break into groups to find solutions for specific problems (or aspects of problems). Each group will report their progress in solving the problems to the whole group.

The Shark Tank (Competitive Model)

Attendees group into "teams" based on a common interest in an aspect or angle of the topic. The objective is to develop a fully crafted project or activity that can be put into operation. Each team pitches its proposal to the session's attendees. A panel of judges asks questions and provides feedback on each proposal. The attendees select a winner.

The Deep Dive

Groups meet together to have an in-depth conversation on a particular topic (or related topics) of interest. Pre-assigned SMEs will have a prepared agenda to guide the discussion. At the end of the discussion, each group should develop answers to the following questions and take-aways:

- What comes next?
- What steps are needed to take action on today's discussion?

After their deep-dive session, each group summarizes their discussion for the session's attendees, sharing their learning and inviting questions and dialog.

Rapid Fire Exchange

The session begins with brainstorming as many possible issues or topics related to the session's theme and placing them into "The Pool." Topics should be fairly narrow or divided into bite-sized pieces. Groups of attendees are formed either randomly or by a common interest. Each group selects a topic from The Pool for discussion and development of actionable solutions. Once they are ready, they choose another topic and repeat the process as time allows.

Facilitated Exploration

A pre-assigned subject matter expert gives a short explanation to ensure everyone has the same information, then group members share their reactions, ask questions, or provide feedback. The facilitator then leads a group discussion on identifying solutions, finding information, and takeaways.
